Commodore's Column



Greetings to all HHYC Members! Welcome to May everyone! The much-anticipated Opening Day of Boating Season is finally here and therefore, (for me anyway) summer cruising season has arrived. This event has been celebrated for well over a century. The history of Opening Day per SYC's website:

The Elliott Bay Yacht Club first used the term, "Opening Day Celebration," on May 1, 1909, when it held three sail races. (The Elliott Bay Yacht Club and the Seattle Yacht Club merged in October that year.) Also in 1909, SYC Commodore H.W. Goucher promoted a "Potlatch Parade" of vachts as a featured event of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific (AYP) Exposition. The Seattle Yacht Club was the official host for boaters during the Exposition. Visiting vachtsmen and national dignitaries enjoyed the hospitality and camaraderie of fellow boaters as they gathered in the SYC Clubhouse, built on pilings just

south of the West Seattle ferry landing. This extravaganza turned out to be one of the highlights of the Exposition, and many historians consider it the first Opening Day. SYC members met on April 20, 1911, to plan for April 29, the 1911 Opening Day. Many Club boats were on display, flags flew at the docks or as they cruised nearby, and bands performed during the afternoon. There were powerboat, sailboat, and dinghy races.

To this day, Seattle Yacht Club continues to play a pivotal role in hosting this storied tradition of which, I will once again represent the Hidden Harbor Yacht Club in the Commissioning Ceremony on the SYC lawn Saturday morning. If you haven't attended before, (and not just because I am participating) I highly encourage you to come experience it!

We just completed our second Rendezvous event for 2024 in Gig Harbor last weekend. It was a huge success with 11 boats. A lot of thanks go out to the hosts Steve and Wendy Rittereiser.

Friday night began with a visit to Heritage Distilling Company for Pizza and hand-crafted cocktails. Saturday, brunch was at the famous Tides Tavern, and then on to a lot of tropical attire to be seen at Margaritaville/ Cheeseburger in Paradise Night in the Net Shed. Some highlights from the board meeting:

Update on Rendezvous Guidelines, specifically the cancellation policy.

Cancellation 72 hours receives full refund or credit for next event. Notification for illness 24 hours (5PM day before) full refund or credit for next event

All other cancellations less than 72 hours will have a \$10 reduction in refund or full credit for the next event. (To help offset costs already incurred by hosts)

No notification, no show, no refund.

The board has decided that we would like to resurrect our Facebook page. The goal of the page is to encourage membership and send the message to "Join the Fun." Satch has agreed to be the moderator for the page. We need to decide security on groups, pages, and guidelines. Satch will start by reviewing and revising these guidelines and make recommendations for HHYC. More updates to come.

Jeremy talked about how we can attract younger people through Instagram. We are looking for a sub-committee with younger folks who can assist in getting us up to speed on Instagram. Satch will also investigate how Instagram and Facebook can interact with each other.


Commodore's Ball: it was decided that the beginning of November is still the best time to have the Ball. Dave will be investigating different venues for this event.


Vice Commodore's Corner Jeremy Hardy

Rear Commodore's Corner Satch Ludington

Cruises are the best part of our club, and last weekend at Gig Harbor was no exception. Although the weather wasn't so friendly, our members were, and we had a full house! All reserved slips were taken, and some even cruised on board with other members or came by car. We had a lot of fun with our existing HHYC friends and made new ones.

It was our pleasure to meet P/C Tom and Barbara Wilson for the first time on this rendezvous. Being relatively new to the club, it was both fascinating and humbling to me to learn from Tom how the current roles and responsibilities of the Bridge officers evolved in the days when he was on the Bridge. I am told that my own responsibilities with respect to reciprocity harken back to that time.

For those of you who do not know, your Rear Commodore is responsible for reciprocity. That is, the privilege of unscheduled guest moorage at other yachting clubs with which we have an agreement to share moorage privileges. Many of you may even have joined Hidden Harbor merely for the reciprocity privileges. I admit that I did, but have since discovered the greater joy of our members and cruising with them.

One thing that has changed considerably with respect to reciprocity in recent years is how it is established, maintained, and used by members. In the US and Canada west coasts, yacht club reciprocity is now managed almost exclusively

by an online service found on the internet at yachtdestinations.org. If you have not yet established an account on that website, you should do so.

It contains all the information needed to find reciprocal

moorage and determine its requirements, costs, marina location, etc. It is comprehensive.

When an account is established at yachtdestinations.org, the system will ask you what yacht club you belong to. If you belong to more than one yacht club, you will have to establish a separate account for each one, but for your HHYC account, it will list all yacht clubs on the west coast and indicate whether or not we have a reciprocal agreement with each. There is even a map that can be browsed to look for them.

Early this year, it was my job to update and request agreements with any clubs with which reciprocity was either not established or expired. That had been done, and there are but a few that do not have agreements with HHYC. I will warn you that there are some clubs that have inordinately high liability insurance requirements, primarily those in Canada, but I learned some interesting techniques at the Gig Harbor rendezvous, that will go unwritten, for addressing those.

Regardless of how it is implemented, reciprocity is one of the most important and desirable benefits of yacht club membership for active cruisers. It can drastically lower the cost of moorage ad encourage cruising to parts unknown. If you haven't taken advantage of the privilege yet, give it a try and see if it works for you. If not, or if you discover a glitch in the database, or if it there is a club with which we do not have reciprocity that you would like to add, don't hesitate to let me know.


